


Beyond The Baccalaureate: Survey of UCSD Bachelor Degree Recipients

In fall 1992, Student Research and Information surveyed 3,736 baccalaureate recipients from three graduating classes — five years, three years and one year after graduating from UCSD.¹ The survey results provide valuable information on the current educational and employment activities of former undergraduates and the relationship of these activities to the undergraduate experience at UCSD. Selected highlights from the study appear below.

 $^1\mathrm{Surveys}$ were mailed to a random sample of former undergraduates, stratified by ethnicity, from the classes of 1986-87 (n = 1,867), 1988-89 (n = 1,094) and 1990-91 (n = 775). Responses are weighted to adjust for disproportionate sampling. After excluding undeliverable surveys, response rates were 34%, 34% and 40%, respectively. 



Postbaccalaureate Degrees* by Type



Percent Ranking UCSD Preparation for Graduate Study "Excellent" or "Good"





The Most Popular Careers Among Those Employed Full-Time Are Business, Computer Programming and Engineering



[□] The percentage of graduates pursuing business careers is higher among 1986-87 graduates than recent graduates, and the percentage employed in primarily technical positions is lower. Five years after graduation, only 2% of former UCSD undergraduates are employed in nonprofessional positions.

Percent Rating Education "Excellent" or "Good" Preparation, by Job Category




Former Undergraduates Give the Highest Ratings to Academics, Colleges and Faculty Teaching
