

# Beyond The Baccalaureate: Survey of UCSD Bachelor Degree Recipients



In fall of 1997, the Office of Student Research and Information/Student Affairs surveyed a total of 5,150 former undergraduates - five years, three years, and one year after graduating from UCSD<sup>1</sup>. The survey results provide valuable information on the current educational and employment activities of former students and the relationship of these activities to the undergraduate experience at UCSD. Selected highlights from the study are presented below.

<sup>1</sup> Surveys were mailed to a random sample of former undergraduates, stratified by ethnicity, from the classes of 1991-92 (n=1950), 1993-94 (n=1750) and 1995-96 (n=1450). Responses were weighted to adjust for disproportionate sampling. After excluding undeliverable surveys, response rates for the three years were 27%, 34%, and 34%, respectively. The margin of error for the three samples is +/- 5% (1991-92), +/- 4% (1993-94), +/-5% (1995-96). # **Current Status of Undergraduate Degree Recipients**

## **Post-baccalaureate Educational Activities:**

Most UCSD undergraduates continue their educational pursuits well beyond the baccalaureate; over half (51%) enroll in an advanced degree program within the first year of graduation.



#### **Post-baccalaureate Employment/Other Activities**

The vast majority of former undergraduates are fully employed and/or pursuing additional educational opportunities.



On average, 20% of all former UCSD undergraduates go on to earn a master's degree, 17% complete a professional doctorate, while 6% earn an academic doctorate (e.g. Ph.D., Ed.D.)



The most popular area of graduate study is Medicine/Health, followed by the Sciences, Business, and Education.



Overall, 95% of all former undergraduates consider the education they received at UCSD as having prepared them well for graduate study.

## **Employment: Facts and Figures**


A large percentage of former undergraduates pursue careers in the field of Business/Finance. Education, Law, and Medicine are also popular career fields among UCSD alumni. As former students gain experience and professional status, salaries tend to increase. The average salary for those students who earned a bachelor's degree in 1995/96 is \$36,000.


The vast majority of former undergraduates (85%) regard the education they received at UCSD as having prepared them well for their current field of employment.

"Attending UCSD was the best choice I could have made for myself. My positive experience can mostly be attributed to Cognitive Science faculty and staff. Plus, the reputation of the Department got me a job." (Male, Cognitive Science, 1995-96)

When being considered for employment, a degree from UCSD is viewed as being important to perspective employers -- as important as major field of study and recommendations; work experience, however, continues to be the most important consideration in hiring decisions.



## **Current Activities: Relationship to Undergraduate Experience**

Problem solving, interpersonal skills, and speaking skills are cited as the most important skills relevant to the current activities of former undergraduates. Problem solving, reasoning, and writing skills, however, are cited as the areas in which UCSD provided the best preparation.


## The UCSD Experience: A Look Back

Overall, former undergraduates are most satisfied with the quality of faculty instruction and the availability and content of the courses they encountered while enrolled at UCSD. Increased satisfaction ratings in the areas of academic advising and opportunities for research, as reported by the 1995/96 graduating class, provide supporting evidence for the success of campus efforts aimed at improving the undergraduate experience in these areas.

Among former undergraduates, the campus environment is viewed as being safe, friendly, and welcoming, and most (9 out of 10) would recommend UCSD, as well as their undergraduate college, to others.
