

# **Beyond The Baccalaureate:** Survey of UCSD Bachelor Degree Recipients



In Fall of 2000, the Office of Student Research and Information/Student Affairs surveyed a total of 4,808 baccalaureate recipients - five years, three years, and one year after graduating from UCSD<sup>1</sup>. The survey results provide valuable information on the current educational and employment activities of former undergraduates and the relationship of these activities to the undergraduate experience at UCSD. Selected highlights from the study are presented below.

<sup>1</sup>Surveys were mailed to a random sample of former undergraduates, stratified by ethnicity, from the classes of 1994-95 (n = 1,793), 1996-97 (n = 1,625), and 1998-99 (n = 1,390). Responses were weighted to adjust for disproportionate sampling. After excluding undeliverable surveys, response rates for the three years were 25%, 26% and 30%, respectively. The margin of error for the three samples is  $\pm$ 5% (1994-95),  $\pm$ 5% (1996-97) and  $\pm$ 5% (1998-99). #### **Current Status of Undergraduate Degree Recipients**

## **Educational Activities**

Most UCSD degree recipients continue their education to pursue an advanced degree; within three years over half (57%) enroll in an advanced degree program.



## **Employment/Other Activities**

The vast majority of all degree recipients are employed and/or pursuing an advanced degree.



On average, 19% of UCSD undergraduate degree recipients go on to earn a master's degree, 15% earn a professional doctorate (e.g., M.D., J.D.), and 5% earn a Ph.D.





The most popular field of graduate study is Education, followed by Medicine, Law, and the Social Sciences.



# **Fields of Graduate Study**

When asked, "How well did UCSD prepare you for graduate/professional school?" almost all (97%) students who went on to graduate/professional school responded that they were "adequately" prepared to "very well" prepared.



I'm in veterinary school and literally learned everything at UCSD that was taught during our first year. I was MUCH more prepared than the other students.

#### **Employment Activity: Facts and Figures**

The most popular areas of employment for UCSD postbaccalaureates are Business, Education, Engineering and Medicine. As former students gain experience and professional status, their salaries tend to increase. The average salary for those students who earned a bachelor's degree in 1998/99 is \$39,000.



#### **Importance of UCSD Experience to Current Activities**

According to former graduates, oral communication, problem solving and interpersonal skills were cited as the most important skills needed in their current activities. Problem solving, quantitative reasoning, and writing skills, however, are cited as the areas in which UCSD provided the best preparation.

Overall, former undergraduates are most satisfied with faculty instruction in their major and the availability and content of courses they completed. At the same time, satisfaction ratings with the availability of courses needed to graduate as well as the availability of courses in general along with opportunities for involvement in campus activities have steadily declined since 1994/95. Increased satisfaction ratings in the areas of academic advising over the years provide supporting evidence for the success of campus efforts aimed at improving the undergraduate experience in these areas.



In regard to campus climate issues, a large majority of former graduates felt welcome at UCSD and that their fellow students were friendly; they also found the campus to be safe and secure. A larger percentage of students in the 1998/99 graduating class characterize the faculty as helpful.



The vast majority of former graduates (93%) indicated that they would "probably yes" to "definitely yes" recommend UCSD to someone considering attending.






■ When asked "Would you recommend your undergraduate college to someone considering to attend?" approximately 88% indicated "probably yes" to "definately yes."
